I recently examined the new gold prospects near Tonopah called the Gilbert, Mammoth, Homestake & Hardscrabble.

At Gilbert there are about one hundred tents and small shacks with a population estimated at 300. Town lots are being sold, and the usual propaganda of a Nevada boom. No real money is going into the camp, except for assessment work and about twenty leasers who started windlass shafts along the main strike.

The original Gilbert strike is not a very attractive showing, because of poor geology and absence of quartz. In Arizona very few people would have heard about it if found there, and I am not sure that I would want to develop it even if the time came when it could be procured on option without payments. It might be worth a little sinking to find the extent of the showing.

The Mammoth is about 1,500 feet from the original strike, and a more attractive showing. It is now a bunch of high grade on the surface which has not been opened up at all, but a 220 foot tunnel started which will take about two months to reach the point under the showing. There is an intersection of dykes where the showing was found, more quartz and a reason to expect the small surface showing might continue. It is a prospect worth working upon if it could be obtained with no payment, but not attractive enough to even think of paying for the privilege.

It will take two or three months to determine either property, as in each case they are starting from the side and delaying work on the main showings.

The Homestake is upon an adjoining claim, and a real quartz fissure vein, but not over 18 inches in average width. In one or two places values close to \$100 in gold have been found, and the whole thing sizes up as a good lease, but not attractive for company operations.

The new find at Hardscrabble consists of a few high grade streaks in a formation anything but attractive, and it is not as interesting a find as those at Gilbert. It is located about five miles from Gilbert on a direct line between there and McLeans.

There will probably be a diminishing but quite considerable number of people in the district for a few months, and it is more interesting for the railroad than for development, and I have gone over the situation with Mr. Cutter.

Have recently talked with Mr. Johnson about this property and also discussed it with Mr. Lawry of the Goldfield Consolidated who made a thorough examination four days ago.

It is not a prospect about which it is possible to get excited because of the very poor formation or geology. No definite vein is disclosed and little or no quartz, values coming in a breccia and similar to many other desert gold prospects which soon play out.

It has however, quite remarkable values and would be worth working upon if no cash were demanded and a reasonable option. In this case the country was staked for miles around the first few days and owners much excited. Cash was demanded and now they have large advertisements in the local papers and are using the usual Nevada methods.

I have your letter of Nov. 6th, and we will make up a swivel as soon as possible such as we made for Hamilton and send it to the Erupcion Vining Company at Al Paso. We did not send you a bill for the swivel which was sent to Hamilton, but as I recollect, it took a machinist three days to make it and the material in it would probably cost several more dollars. This makes a swivel cost between \$20,00 and \$25.00.

Last Thursday I made a trip out to the New gold strike which the Gilbert brothers have made. The camp lies in the old Silver Fields district and is about seventeen miles from Millers. The work which has been done consists of a shaft about 25 ft. deep with a short drift of about 3 ft. to the north from the bottom of the shaft. The shaft was in ore all the way and the bottom of the shaft is still in ore. From the work done it is not possible to tell just what they have. There are no well defined walls and at present it is my opinion that if there is a vein it is running approximately north and south. We have had a sample sent in from there for test, prior to taking a shipment of this ore at the mill. This sample went about 2-1/2 ounces in gold and 2-1/2 ounces in silver. The gold is free

I took several samples while I was there and obtain the following results:

- #1. A grab sample from the muck pile which had been broken down the night before gave 3.90 ozs. in gold and 1.94 ozs. silver. This represents the last round broken from the drift north of the bottom of the shaft which I mentioned above.
- #2. A cut sample taken across the north end of this drift gave 1.48 ozs. gold and .52 ozs. silver.
- bottom of the skart gave .08 of an ounce in gold and trace in silver
- #4. Sample taken from the west end of the bottom of the shaft and extending to the face of the north drift gave .62 of an ounce in gold and trace in silver.

I do not consider this last sample of much importance as I believe about two-thirds of it is waste, or the same as Sample No. 3. and the other one-third the same as Sample No. 2. From this limited sampling, it appears that the ore lies wholly in the material on which they are drifting from the north side of the bottom of the shaft. This material is a sort of a breccia and I believe the fragments are probably dacite.

the work done, the vein does not extend south, or there is a fault which displaces the vein and which must be prospected for. wheat size from the wash. The district has been located for several miles around there by Stimler and others of his caliber. I will keep you informed as far as possible as to the developments in this district.

Saturday I made a trip to Ubehebe with Joe Crook and looked over a property there which is jointly owned by Mr. Crook, Charles Knox and associates. This is a limestone district and high grade lead ore deposits are found in the limestone. deposits are lenticular in shape and one which has mined some time ago was about 30 ft. wide, 40 ft. long and 8 to 10 ft. high and produced about 700 tons of lead ore assaying about percent lead The main property is developed by and 15 to 20 oundes in silver. a north and south tunnel about 650 feet long; numerous workings een made east and west from this tunnel. At a point several feet in from the mouth of the tunnel a raise has been driven up about 25 ft. and the top of the raise is in very good lead ore. At a point about 150 ft. north of this, another raise has been put up which went thru about 4 ft. of high grade lead ore and then thru 6 or 8 ft. of ore which Crook says contains both lead and zinc. At a point 22 ft. west of this raise the top of a shaft shows high grade lead ore: at a point 52 ft. to the north of this lest raise another raise was put up which shows about 18 inches of high grade lead ore.

The whole district is highly mineralized, and it is a question whether or not the ore deposits as found will be large enough and rich enough to warrant prospecting for them.
