

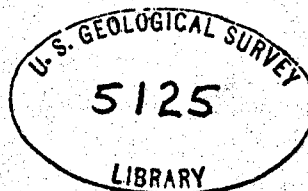

BRUNO DISTRICT.

This district is east of Bruno Creek, joining Wyoming. It was discovered in 1864, and organized in the fall of 1869, and is fifteen miles square. It is well supplied with wood, water and grass. Granite, slate, limestone and quartzite constitute the prevailing rocks.

YOUNG AMERICA.

Located in July, 1869. Eight hundred feet are claimed. The ledge is traced about two miles. Course, northwest. The ore is scattered through vein matter, three feet wide. The pay seam is only six inches wide. The ore is of a very high grade, assaying from \$300 to \$600 per ton, closely selected. The ledge is stripped twenty-five feet.
