THE COYOTTE PROSPECT

Jessup is located about 32 miles west from Lovelock. The nearest station on the Southern Pacific is Ocala - 8 1/2 miles distant over a fair road.

The scale of wages is \$4 per eight hour day as in Tenopah.

There is no water in camp - the present supply being hauled from the railroad.

Jessup was located about 1906 - 1907. Two of the mines have reached a depth of 200 feet and the "O-O" mine is said to have some very good ore. None of the mines are working steadily, however, a few leasers here and there bringing up the population of the camp to about twenty people.

At the Coyotte prospect the country rock is white to pink rhyolite showing numerous hornblende crystals. One or more dikes of basalt outcrop prominently, and are associated with ore in other parts of camp but not at this point.

A few sacks of high grade ore was taken from a small pocket of crushed quartz very heavily iron stained. My sample (#14) taken from the same cut and below this pocket seven feet from the surface assayed \$2.23 per ton.

The development work consisted of a few shallow cuts and a prospect shaft seven feet in depth.

The property consists of three claims which were located about Sept. 1, 1913 and are owned by Beeson and Mackeson of Lovelock.

Terms

A two year option - no cash payment - total price \$80,000 - 50% of gross value of ore shipped to apply on the purchase price - development required 100 shifts per month.

This option was given to a Mr. Wilson of San Francisco who accompanied me on the examination.

Conclusion

This prospect was turned down and Mr. Wilson was so advised.
