Dear Sir:-

I arrived here last night, after stopping off a day at Hazen, before receiving your telegram addressed to Winnemucca. I find as yet no instructions either by wire or mail.

In Kennedy I stayed only over night as otherwise I would have had to remain four days, and from your telegram I judged that more important matters were pending. Also Mr. Kennedy told me that just at present his properties were not in shape to show, and he would prefer our waiting until a later date for an examination. His strike is on the Fourth of July Group, and is opened up only on one level gaining about 50' vertical in depth. This shows a vein about 6" wide only, and on which he has done some stoping which has paid good wages. The ore is oxidized and talcy, and the country shows some alteration, demomposition and faulting. The vein widens in places to 18" in width but when this occurs two classes are made of the ore. A lower tunnel is being driven to cut this same ledge 50' (vertical) below the tunnel mentioned. As yet this tunnel has not reached the vein. The vein has a strike of N. 60° W. and a dip of 40° to the S.W. It will probably develope into a contact wein between Granite and Quartsite. Mr. Kennedy promised to let us knew when the vein was out in the lewer tunnel, and a thorough examination can then be made.

My report on the Battle newskip preperty is ready when I have the assay returns.

There is a new strike 18 miles north of Fairview known as Camp Wonder. The assays I saw were very good indeed, but no work has as yet been done.

The Imperial Group at Kennedy is unchanged since Mr. Humphrey's report of about one year ago.
