Muncey Creek Mines at Muncey, Nevada.

The Muncey Creek Mines are situated at Muncey White Pine Co. Nevada, in the Silver Mountain Mining District, about thirty miles Northeast of Ely and twenty-two miles from McGill Smelter by way of Shell Creek Mountain Road, through Kalamazee Canyon and North Creek Canyon.

The property is on an elevation of 6500 to 7500 feet and on the Eastern slope of the Shell Creek Range. It can be reached by stage running three times a week from Cherry Creek, a station on the Nevada Northern R.R. to Aurum, or McGill by the new Shell Creek road a team can be driven direct to the lower mines, or can be hauled by automobile trucks from Muncey to McGill Smelter for \$4.00 per ton.

There are seventeen claims in the group, partly patented, no transfers have ever been made; the full annual assessment has been done. Water from Muncey can be run by gravity to the mines.

GEOLOGY.

The rock formation of the Muncey property is similar to the Ely District, and consists of porphyry and limestone and quartzites.

The lower contact is between limestone stones on the North and the Dacite on the South. Ore on this contact is copper.

The upper contact between andisite on the Northwest and limestone on the Southeast, good leads are shown here, with less copper on the claims, five in number.

Water Power Available.

Muncey Creek has 150 miners inches in low season, and Kalamazoo Creek 300 inches. Plenty of timber for mining purposes.

IMPROVEMENTS.

Near the Grand Deposite Shaft are the following buildings,-

1 Bunk house 15½x50 feet.

1 Cook house 15x42 feet-kitchen, dining, and two bed rooms.

1 Office and Sup't. residence 21x34 feet 6 rooms and cellar.

These houses are double bearded with heavy building paper between ready for immediate use.

1 Stone cellar back of cook house.

1 Adobe house for assay office.

2 Barns with room for 15 head of horses.

EQUIPMENTS.

On the Grand Deposite and Sunrise are the following,

1 Building 66x30 feet with boiler and hoist.

1 Blacksmith and carpenter shop 16x20.

1 Stone powder magazine 9x10.

1 Small blacksmith shop.

1 Gallows frame 60 feet high well ^{made}, in good ordre.

1 Small gallows frame on incline shaft.

Under Ground Workings.

The workings on the Grand Deposite consists of one vertical two compartment crib shaft 90 feet deep, each compartment 4x5 in the clear; also one incline shaft 180 feet deep a winze ninety feet deep and several hundred feet of drift. These workings show a

body of ore 66 feet long 4 feet wide, extending to within 20 feet of the surface. The ore body may be more extensive than this as the length and width are not exposed.

The average value of this ore is about \$32 per ton based on copper @ 12¢ per pound and silver @ 50¢ per ounce:

The Kamsas bids fair to yield an enormous tonnage.

A ledge is now exposed 10 to 15 feet wide for a surface length of 300 feet. An incline shaft is sunk 70 feet on the foot wall exposing the ore all the way. Chips taken from the cavings across the vein runs 5% copper, 5 1/2% iron, 11 1/2% silica.

We are now working on this claim, we run a drift across the ore a distance of 50 feet all in ore and the values are from 10 to 20% copper. We are now sinking a shaft to drift from and tap this ore body. We don't know yet how big it is but from present indications it is about 100 feet wide and 600 feet long.

On the upper contact are five claims, they are lead carbonates with some copper.

Free smelting ores run from 40% to 70% lead and 12 ounces in silver.
