Dear Mr. Johnson:

While Mr. Lindsley was here, we had a talk regarding the Gold Pen Rand property. We showed him Mr. Sharp's preliminary report on the Gold Pen and your wire to the effect that Sharp's report on the Gold Pen Rand would be adverse.

Mr. Lindsley frankly stated that he asked for the examination largely for the purpose of getting Mr. Sharp's reaction to the geological situation.

It now seems to me that the two of them have looked at it from slightly different angles. Mr. Sharp in his report on the Gold Pen seems to feel that the values are associated with a solution which kaolomized the vein and accompanying wall rock for a considerable width. While Mr. Lindsley is more inclined to feel that the values are associated with manganese. Probably most of the kaolinization is on the Gold Pen, while the manganese is on the Gold Pen Rand. Furthermore, Mr. Lindsley felt that the mineralization was so dispersed on the Gold Pen, that it could hardly be of value, while the mineralization and break on the Gold Pen Rand is quite confined, and he thought might be of more interest.

 You have sent on Sharp's report on the Gold Pen, and I will read it eventually, but in the meantime wish you would discuss this phase with Mr. Sharp, and write me his reaction to the possibility of the Gold Pen Rand being more confined and therefore of more possible interest, as well as to the possibility of the values being associated with manganese.

Dear Chief:

Enclosed please find a copy of the report which Sharp has made on the Gold Pen Rand.

Having been on the ground, I think this report will be of more intelligence to you than it is to me. I do not seem to be able to make much out of it, except that Sharp does not seem to be of the opinion that the fractured zone is more confined on the Gold Pen Rand than on the Gold Pen. He does seem to feel throughout his report that the values are associated with quartz, and thinks he found much less quartz on the Gold Pen Rand than on the Gold Pen.

If there is anything more that I can do about this report, or any other data that you wish collected or checked, kindly instruct me.
