Tonopah Gypsy Queen Mining Company

This company was formed in 1912 as a reorganization of the Gypsy Queen Consolidated Mining Company. The latter company had earlier been known as the Bodie Consolidated Mining Company. Four patented claims compose the property which lies north of the Montana Tonopah and North Star Mines. The main shaft of the mine is 1800 feet deep and from it about 2 miles of workings have been driven.

Work on the claims started about in 1905 or 1906, when the sinking of the shaft was started and some lateral work was done on the upper levels.

Another period of activity appears to have been in the years following 1914 when the shaft was deepened. In 1923 the Montana-Tonopah secured a lease on the property below the 1650-foot level. The shaft was deepened and considerable work was done on some new levels that were driven from the deepened portion.

This work failed to show orebodies of sufficient size or grade, however, and work ceased late in 1925. The mine has been closed since that time.

No ore has been produced from the mine, so far as known. The work done prior to the time the mine was leased to the Montana Tonopah was financed chiefly by assessments, nineteen of which had been leased up to 1923.

Gentlemen:

The following explanation is given with reference to the credit item of Sand Tails in our Mill Operating statement for the month of February. The same explanation will apply similarly in connection with all subsequent mill operating statements showing treatment of Sand Tails:

It was agreed that the Midway Sand Tails should bear a fixed charge of 60% a ton. This cost charge is made up of eleven small costs conforming to eleven of the sixteen costs against ore treatment.

In order not to complicate the monthly operating sheet, it was decided to charge all milling costs both for ore and sand tails against crude ore, as in the previous months, and then to issue credit to the crude ore for the total cost of handling the sand tails. This cost, being very small, is shown as one credit item instead of eleven very small items credited to eleven cost accounts.

The Jim Butler Mining Company was incorporated in 1924 as a reorganization of the Jim Butler Tonopah Mining Company. The older company
was formed in 1903 as a consolidation of the Salt Lake and Tonopah Mining
Company, the Tonopah Fraction Mining Company, the Tonopah City Mining

Company, the Gold Hill Mining Company, and the Brougher group of claims.

In 1911 the Ophir King group of claims was purchased making a total of 23
claims with an area of 33,231 acres included within the property. As a result of the reorganization in 1924 the Tonopah Belmont company acquired a
controlling interest in the company.

There are at least eight shafts upon the property. From them and from the Desert Queen shaft of the Tonopah Mining Company of Nevada, approximately 10 miles of workings have been driven on the company's property. Of the shafts, the Big Tonopah (335 feet deep) and the Tonopah City (575 feet deep) had no mine workings driven from them. The Wandering Boy incline (95 feet deep), the Fraction No. 1 (400 feet deep), the Fraction No. 2 (427 feet deep), and the Gold Hill (805 feet deep) shafts were all sunk in the early days of Tonopah and have not been used for many years. The workings from the last

three shafts are however connected with other shafts. The Stone Cabin shaft is over 700 feet deep but has been used only by leasers for a number of years.

The Wandering Boy shaft is about 900 feet deep and was the main operating shaft for all mining operations in that vicinity. A large part of the ore mined from the property, however, was hoisted through the Desert Queen shaft, which was leased to the Jim Butler company for several years.

On several of the claims now included within the property of the company, ore-bearing veins were found at the surface and small shipments were made from these by the Gold Hill and the Tonopah and Salt Lake companies in 1902. and 1903. Veins that did not outcrop were also found in shafts sunk by the Fraction company in 1902 and caused, as a result, much ill-advised prospecting in nearby claims. After the organization of the original Jim Butler company late in 1903, prospecting apparently consumed all of the energies of the company since there is no record of any production until 1906 when shipments began on a small scale. The ore bodies that were found, however, were of small size and irregular grade, and a system of leasing was established in 1908 or 1909 that continued until the latter part of 1912 when company shipments from the Wandering Boy mine were resumed. This was made possible in part by an agreement

with the Tonopah Mining Company that prevented any apex trouble over the Fraction vein. Shortly thereafter it was discovered that some of the veins mined by the Belmont company continued into Jim Butler ground and ore from this source provided a period of considerable prosperity that lasted until 1918. This prosperous period was marked by two disputes with the West End company, one of which, concerning extralateral rights on the south limb of the Tonopah fault, has been described on page ---. The other, which arose over the apex of the Fraction vein was settled out of court in 1918. With the exhaustion of the orebodies in the vicinity of the Belmont, a leasing system was again employed but this has produced only minor amounts of ore since 1923. Company work ceased entirely in 1921. In that year and succeeding years, money had been borrowed from the Belmont company, and the inability of the Jim Butler company to repay these advances caused the reorganization in 1924.
