Reports are favorable but they are more in the nature of hopes than assurances, as no definite facts have come out. The moratorium will likely be extended beyond the 12 days originally set, and newspaper talk is such as to groom the public to that idea. Am enclosing original of Service Report by Mr. Campbell, of the Edison Storage Battery Co., on our Edison Batteries. You will note that I have placed an arrow to indicate the report on the "Little Trammer", the first column is on another locomotive. This report, No. 48055, is the only copy we have and I suggest that you make a copy for your records and return this to us.

So far I have been unable to locate the original bills on the Ingersoll-Rand compressors at our Halifax property. The following data is sufficient to give you necessary information on them and I shall look up more detail later. Size 20 1/4 x 12 1/4 x 12, Model JJ-2 (am not sure of this letter JJ), fitted with A 18 Chokáng Controller. Motor is G.E. Type I, Form K, 440 Volt, 3 Phase, 60 cycle, 720 R.P.M. Short belt drive with idler used.

We have two duplicate machines of the above type, with same size motors, 100 H.P., with a 48" x 12' Vertical type receiver and connections. Our price is \$2500.00 for the two complete.

The two Gould triplex pumps I mentioned to you are duplicates, 4 1/2 x 8, capacity 100 gallons per minute at 1000 foot head. Motors are 50 H.P. Type L, Form K, G. E., 900 R.P.M., 440 Volt, 3 Phase, 60 Cycle. Starter is G. E. type N.R. - 1630. Short belt drive with idler used. We also have a large spring type alleviator, which cost \$312, which goes with the pumps if sold as a unit.

We offer these pumps complete, with motors and alleviator, for \$1700.00, F.O.B. Tonopah.

The Worthington is a triplex, 5 x 9, belt drive by 40 H.P. Westinghouse CCL motor, 1120 RPM, capacity 120 gallons per minute at probably over 1000 foot head. We used it on 400 foot head only but is built for a much higher head than that. We have placed a price on this pump and motor of \$750.00 FOB Tonopah.

All of the above machinery is in good shape and was in active operation until the Halifax property was closed down. The pumps were removed from the mine and greased well. We always maintained an efficient mechanical force and for this reason I believe that this machinery will be found to be mechanically O. K.
