

Victor E. Kral Mining Engineer In compliance with your request I am sending herewith all the information I have regarding four claims in Willow Creek Mining District, in Nye

Am enclosing two letters written by one Steve J. Pappas, original discoverer of the claims, and well known prospector, in answer to my inquiries regarding reports of the returns he actually got out of them and a perusal of them will give you a very good idea of their discovery and early history.

Am also enclosing a report of one A E. Place, Mining Engineer of this City, which should give you some idea of the location and general description of the territory which is embraced by the four claims as relocated in 1929. Note what Pappas says in regard to values given in Place's report, also subsecuent letter from Place in 1933 to a prospective lessee. Enclosed also is a profile of vein accompanying said report.

The letter from one F. A. Cassady, now deceased, who at one time had a bond and lease on several claims about a mile further up the canyon, then owned by Goodman, et al, of Ely, which letter indicates there is a reasonable chance of development of a paying mine.

I became interested in these claims in 1932 under the impression that the then owner was a practical miner. Though I had never seen a mine I set up a small ball mill, compressor plant and pump and proceeded to mill the most promising part of the dumps which had been mined by the original discoverers and their lessees. I had thought to recover enough from the dumps to enable me to do some development work but after milling an estimated fifty tons returns dwindled to the diminishing point and I refused to go ahead until I could become associated with some one who knew what the score was. However, I recovered, by amalgamation, about \$450. and am enclosing assay report of R. R. F. Robb of Tonopah, from our first clean up. Subsequently I sent two small batches direct to the mint at Carson City to make up the first named total. I let somebody take these mint reports and like a lot of other dope I had lent I never got them back. Since 1932 I have obtained title to the claims from the former owner and have complied with all the requirements as to assessments, filing of certificates, etc.

Finally I am enclosing a map of the entire Willow Creek District which was surveyed by Louis D. Rasor, U. S. Mineral Surveyor, in 1927. Mr. Razor, whom I knew very well (he is now deceased) felt certain that these claims would ultimately be developed into a small paying proposition, but he was unable to help me to contact any reliable sources for the necessary cash.

At one time I had some very wonderful samples which had been taken from the dumps but was foolish enough to let a couple of sharks take them. When I asked for their return I was told they had lost them but my idea is that they ground them up and mixed them with their samplings. From the way the tunnel walls are now no such assays as they claim to have gotten are possible.
